# PROPOSED ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A FOREST PRESERVE NEAR MICHAEL J. O'MALLEY PRESERVE

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A FOREST PRESERVE in part of Section 30, Township 35, Range 15, all in Cook County, Illinois near Michael J. O'Malley Preserve in District 6.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, Illinois (the "District"), pursuant to the statutes in such case made and provided, has from time to time acquired by purchase, condemnation, gift, grant, devise, or otherwise, lands necessary and desirable for District purposes containing one or more natural forests or parts thereof, or lands connecting such forests or parts thereof, or lands capable of being reforested for the purpose of protecting and preserving the flora, fauna, and scenic beauties within the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, Illinois, and to restore, restock, protect, and preserve the natural forests and said lands together with their flora and fauna, as nearly as may be, in their natural state and condition, for the purpose of the education, pleasure, and recreation of the public; and

WHEREAS, the said Board of Commissioners of the District also has acquired in like manner lands for the consolidation of such preserves into unit areas of a size and form convenient and desirable for public use and economical maintenance and improvement, and lands for the purpose of connecting such preserves with forested ways or links in order to increase their accessibility, use, and enjoyment, and lands for improvement by forestation, roads, and pathways, and lands for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating recreational facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the District has in a like manner acquired lands along water courses or elsewhere which, in their judgment, were required to control drainage and water conditions and necessary for the preservation of forested areas acquired or to be acquired as preserves and lands for the purpose of extension of roads and forested ways around and by such preserves and for parking space for automobiles and other facilities not requiring forested areas but incidental to the use and protection thereof.

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Board of Commissioners of the District as follows:

Section 1. That a unified Forest Preserve be and the same is hereby created within the District which shall contain and connect lands now owned and lands to be acquired in substantial accordance with the plat now on file in the office of the General Superintendent of the District, which by reference is hereby made part hereof, and for the purposes of said Forest Preserve and for the carrying out of the statutory purposes more particularly set out in the preamble of this ordinance, it is necessary and desirable for the District to own and it shall acquire property hereinafter described in Section 2 of this ordinance, for the purpose of creating a Forest Preserve and for District uses.

Section 2. That the lands referred to in Section 1 of this ordinance are more particularly described as follows:

2730 Sauk Trail, Unincorporated Cook County, Illinois (AKA 2801 E. Sauk Trail, Sauk Village, IL)

THE EAST ONE-HALF OF THE NORTHWEST QUARTER (E ½ NW ¼) OF SECTION THIRTY (30), TOWNSHIP THIRTY-FIVE (35), RANGE FIFTEEN (15), IN BLOOM TOWNSHIP, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

PIN: 33-30-101-001-0000

#### SAID PARCEL CONTAINING 3,222,133 SQUARE FEET, OR 73.97 ACRES, MORE OR LESS.

Section 3. This ordinance is hereby made and ordained to be severable as to each parcel of land or portion thereof or right of interest in any of the same hereby authorized to be acquired, and failure to acquire any of the said parcels of land described in Section 2 hereof or right of interest in any of the same shall not impair or invalidate the authority by this ordinance granted to hold, own, or acquire any other of said parcels or any right or interest therein, it being the intention of said Board of Commissioners of the District to carry out the general plan provided in this ordinance so far as legally and financially practicable, and to negotiate for purchase, condemn, or otherwise acquire from time to time the parcel(s) of land described in Section 2 hereof and all right or interest therein.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

# WETLAND MITIGATION BANK AGREEMENT AND PROPOSED ACCEPTANCE OF REAL ESTATE DONATION

**Department(s):** Department of Resource Management

Vendor: HGS, LLC D/B/A RES Environmental Operating Company, LLC, Bellaire, Texas

Request: Authorization for the Forest Preserves of Cook County (the "Forest Preserves") to enter into and execute

**Good(s) or Service(s):** Agreement for HGS, LLC to develop, manage and maintain a wetland mitigation bank on Forest Preserves property in unincorporated Cook County near Sauk Village, and authorization for the Forest Preserves to accept donated property from HGS, LLC with a corresponding deed restriction or similar instrument.

Contract Value: Not to exceed \$10,000.00 in miscellaneous real estate fees, such as closing costs.

**Contract Period:** From date of execution until Mitigation Bank Closeout as determined by the appropriate federal authorities (the Forest Preserves will assume long-term maintenance responsibilities thereafter).

**Estimated Fiscal Impact:** Not to Exceed \$10,000.00. After Mitigation Bank Closeout, the Forest Preserves expects to receive approximately \$260,000.00 via a fund established by HGS, LLC and held by the Forest Preserves or a third-party fiduciary for the long-term management, maintenance, and stewardship of the mitigation site.

Summary: HGS, LLC ("HGS") is a subsidiary of Resource Environmental Solutions, which provides comprehensive ecological restoration and water resource solutions, serving public and private sector clients with full-delivery, land-based projects that build and sustain natural resiliency in ecosystems. HGS has rights to purchase an approximately  $(\pm)$  71.7 acre parcel directly adjacent to Forest Preserves property located at Torrence Avenue and Sauk Trail Road near Sauk Village (the "Donation Parcel"). HGS seeks to develop a wetland mitigation bank utilizing all or a portion of this property together with approximately  $(\pm)$  32.9 acres of Forest Preserves land, subject to the approval of the applicable federal agencies. Upon acquisition of the Donation Parcel and federal approval with respect to the mitigation bank, HGS will conduct ecological restoration of wetlands within the boundaries of the mitigation bank site, as approved by the Forest Preserves. This ecological restoration will benefit wildlife and restore native vegetation. HGS will also sell credits from the wetland mitigation bank to third parties.

Upon approval of the wetland mitigation bank plan, the Donation Parcel owned by HGS will then be donated to the Forest Preserves. Per federal regulations, the Forest Preserves will then be required to record a deed to the donated property that includes a declaration of a restrictive covenant, a deed restriction or a similar instrument restricting use of the property in accordance with the federally-approved Mitigation Banking Instrument and Plan. After Closeout of the Mitigation Bank, the Forest Preserves will then serve as the long-term steward of the mitigation site, which will include the Donation Parcel. The Donation Parcel is more fully described in the legal description included in related Board Item No. 25-0007. The acquisition of the Donation Parcel would advance the goals of the Forest Preserves' Southeast Cook County Land Acquisition Plan, Next Century Conservation Plan, and Acquisition and Disposition of Land Position Paper.

The area of the wetland mitigation bank is expected to total approximately  $(\pm)$  104 acres, which will be restored by HGS at no direct cost to the Forest Preserves. Upon successful completion of all performance standards for a period of at least seven (7) years and the official Closeout of the Mitigation Bank, the Forest Preserves will assume long-term maintenance and stewardship responsibilities for the mitigation site with the support of a monetary fund established by HGS on behalf of the Forest Preserves and held by the Forest Preserves or a third-party fiduciary. If the federal authorities require a third-party fiduciary to hold these long-term maintenance funds per the approved Mitigation Plan, the Forest Preserves will bring the details of any such agreement before the Board for approval.

Alaka Wali is curator emerita of North American Anthropology in the Science and Education Division of the Field Museum. Alaka was born in India and came to the United States as a child. Curious about issues of cultural identity, she studied anthropology at Harvard and Columbia, focusing on the challenges facing Indigenous peoples and their efforts to maintain cultural practices and worldviews.

She was the founding director of the Center for Cultural Understanding and Change at The Field Museum from 1995- 2010. During that time, she pioneered the development of participatory social science research and community engagement processes based in museum science. She curated the North American collection, one of the Museum's largest regional anthropology holdings. Since 2000, she has worked closely with ecologists and museum educators to develop innovative community engagement strategies for people living in and around biodiverse regions of the Western Amazon and urban Chicago to expand inclusion of their voices in environmental conservation efforts.

Her research focuses on the relationship between art and the capacity for social resilience. She has authored several books, and published monographs and more than 50 articles on a wide range of topics, including museum practice, political ecology, racialized health disparities and urban anthropology. She has curated numerous exhibitions, pioneering co-curated exhibitions with Native American contemporary artists. She led the curation of the exhibition-Native Truths: Our Voices, Our Stories which opened in May 2022 and broke new ground for the Field Museum with a deeply collaborative approach that privileges the perspectives of Native American scholars, artists and community members. A companion edited volume became available in 2024 from BAR Publishing.

From 2016-2024, Alaka served on the Board of the Gaylord and Dorothy Donnelley Foundation which focuses on land conservation and artistic vitality in Chicago and the Low Country of South Carolina. She has also served on other Chicago region Boards including the Chicago Cultural Alliance and the Latin School of Chicago.

These three (3) governmental agencies continue to provide leadership and financial support to protect community-managed open spaces in Chicago.

Report Title: American Humane Conservation Certification

#### Certification Period: 12/16/2024 - 12/15/2025

**Summary:** On December 16, 2024, the Forest Preserves of Cook County (the "Forest Preserves") was awarded a Certificate of Approval in the American Humane Association's ("American Humane") Conservation Certification Program for its Ambassador Animal Program at its six nature centers. In June, the Forest Preserves of Cook County Board of Commissioners re-approved (with updated terms) the agreement with American Humane to have the Forest Preserves' six Nature Centers go through the certification program (See Board Item No. 24-0077). In October, American Humane had an auditor spend a week at the Nature Centers, observing the Ambassador Animals, reviewing procedures and records and talking with and observing staff as they provided husbandry, enrichment and programming with and for the Ambassador Animals.

The assessment included evaluating the animals' enclosures, behaviors, food quality, physiological metrics, choice, environmental parameters, care and more. In its assessment, American Humane asked the Forest Preserves to address one item related to two Snapping Turtles at Sagawau Environmental Learning Center and Sand Ridge Nature Center. With an action plan in place for that issue, the final approval was provided by American Humane, which is the first national humane organization in America and the world's largest certifier of the welfare and humane treatment of animals in working and other environments. American Humane's animal welfare certification programs are built on the foundation of science and evidence-based practices, with independent third-party leading experts, scientists, behaviorists and ethicists determining what practices are indeed humane.

In its letter to the Forest Preserves upon receiving the certification, Robin R. Ganzert, Ph.D., President & CEO said, "I would like to congratulate you and your team at the Forest Preserves of Cook County for your demonstrated commitment to animal welfare. You have joined an elite group of institutions around the world to earn the *American Humane Certified*<sup>TM</sup> seal of approval, and I commend you for your dedicated work in providing exceptional welfare to the animals in your care while educating and inspiring the next generation of conservationists."

#### PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

### AMENDMENT TO ETHICS ORDINANCE

**BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners, that Title 1 - Administrative, Chapter 13 - Code of Ethical Conduct, Section 1-13-2, Subsection L (7) of the Forest Preserve District Code is hereby amended as follows:

### 1-13-2: - CODE OF CONDUCT.

L. Political Activity.

(7) Except as provided by subsection c, Sixty days prior to a general, primary, or special election and ending the day after such election in which an elected Official is a candidate, District funds and <u>or resources</u> may not be used by any elected District Official to print, mail, transmit, or pay for the printing, mailing, or transmission of any newsletters or brochures bearing the proper name of the elected District Official during the period of time design, print, transmit, and/or distribute;

a. <u>Print newsletters or brochures bearing the name or image of the elected District</u> <u>Official who is a candidate in an election;</u> <u>Sixty (60) days prior to a general primary</u> <u>election and ending the day after such general primary election; and</u>

b. <u>Public service announcements or advertisements that are on behalf of a District</u> administered program and contains the proper name, image, or voice of an elected <u>District Official who is a candidate in an election that is broadcast or aired on radio or</u> television, printed in a commercial newspaper or commercial magazine, or shared or posted on any District owned website or District owned social media account. Sixty (60) days prior to a general election and ending the day after such general election.

c. <u>Exceptions</u>. The prohibitions in paragraphs 7a and 7b of this section shall not apply to: This Section shall not apply to:

(1) Responses to unsolicited inquiries from constituents and other interested parties; or

(2) Informational brochures that are solely related to and accompany any mailing of a property tax bill, notice of property tax assessment, or notice of voter registration or polling place information, or to a brochure mailed to a constituent in response to that constituent's inquiry concerning the needs of that constituent or questions raised by that constituent.

(3) Budget Books (Annual Appropriations Ordinances); annual and other official reports; memos, letters, and other communications on District letterhead; and coverage of press releases on official District events noting speakers or ribbon cutting or other official duties of elected Officials.

d. No public service announcement or advertisement that is on behalf of any District

administered program and contains the proper name, image, or voice of any elected District Official shall be paid with District funds and broadcast or aired on radio or television or printed in a commercial newspaper or commercial magazine at any time on or after the date that the elected District Official files nominating papers for any elected office, and ending the day after such general election if the elected District Official is a candidate in such primary or general election. This Section shall not apply to any information available or posted by the District or any elected District Official on any District owned website or District owned social media account or broadcast or aired on the "public educational, government access" channels.

e. <u>Permanent Prohibitions.</u> The proper name or image of any elected Official may not appear on any promotional materials or items if designed, paid for, produced, and/or distributed with public funds or resources, including, but not limited to:

- (1) Bumper stickers;
- (2) Commercial billboards;
- (3) Lapel pins or buttons;
- (4) Magnets;
- (5) Sports teams;
- (6) Items of clothing or apparel;
- (7) Stickers;

(8) Calendars, with the exception of the annual District wall calendar which highlights and features photographic images of the flora and fauna, historical buildings, and landmarks within the District;

- (9) Vehicles; or
- (10) Equipment.

f. At no time during official district events, shall any Official disseminate or display political promotional material that includes the Official's name and/or image.
