While it may take our bodies (and minds) some time to adjust, plant and wildlife in the preserves are already preparing for the cooler temperatures. Even though the trees will be losing their leaves as we wait for the inevitable snow to fall, there is still much fun to be had in the preserves.

Throughout the season, Sagawau Environmental Learning Center will be offering cross-country skiing along its groomed trails, weather permitting, as well as lessons for beginners and ski rentals. Snowshoeing is also gaining in popularity throughout our many trails, offering an opportunity to see the preserves blanketed in snow and spot wildlife against the breathtakingly stark backdrop of winter. Designated areas of the preserves also offer ice skating, ice fishing, snowmobiling and sledding when conditions are adequate.

For the first time this season, visitors can camp in our newly built, heated cabins. If you had the chance to experience our new campgrounds this summer, I encourage you to try out camping in the winter months at camps Reinberg, Bullfrog Lake and Sullivan. If you are new to camping altogether, free winter camping workshops are also provided by Forest Preserves staff.

If these outdoor activities already have you thinking about the cold, remember you can still enjoy the “great indoors,” just be sure to do so inside one of the six nature centers, where winter related educational programming will keep you warm and the children entertained.

SNOW & ICE

From sledding to cross-country skiing to ice fishing and more, the Forest Preserves offers many options for enjoying the winter months in Cook County.

■ SLEDDING

We offer four sledding hills with lighting, open 10 am – 9 pm:

- Dan Ryan Woods – Chicago
- Caldwell Woods – Chicago
- Deer Grove #5 – Palatine
- Westchester Woods – Westchester

The sledding hill at Swallow Cliff in Palos Park is closed for the 2015–16 season.

We also offer five sledding spots without lighting, open 10 am – sunset:

- Indian Hill Woods – Chicago Heights
- Pioneer Woods – Willow Springs
- Indian Road Woods – Chicago
- Schiller Woods – Schiller Park
- Deer Grove #4 – Palatine

Sledding hills are open when there are at least 3” of snow on frozen ground.

■ CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING & SNOWSHOEING

Visitors can cross-country ski in all parts of the Forest Preserves, except for golf courses and nature centers, from sunrise to sunset. Sagawau Environmental Learning Center in Lemont offers a complete Nordic Ski Program, including groomed trails and lessons. See page 10 for details. All areas are open to snowshoeing. Some nature centers offer snowshoes to use free of charge. Check center listings.

■ ICE FISHING

Ice fishing is permitted at 22 designated waterbodies, from 8 am to sunset. Fish at your own risk—ice conditions are not monitored by the Forest Preserves. A minimum of 4” of solid ice over the entire lake is strongly recommended. Find a complete list of locations at fpdcc.com/recreation/winter.

■ SNOWMOBILING

Snowmobiling is allowed in five designated areas, 10 am – 10 pm:

- Ned Brown Meadow – Rolling Meadows
- Miller Meadow – Maywood
- Morrill Meadow – Palos Hills
- Turtlehead Lake – Orland Park
- North Creek Meadow – Lansing

Snowmobile areas are opened with a 4” snow base on frozen turf. Snowmobiles must be registered with the State of Illinois and the Forest Preserves of Cook County. Proof of insurance is required. Permits can be obtained at General Headquarters in River Forest or online. Fee applies.

■ ICE SKATING

Visitors can ice skate from 8 am to sunset on six designated lakes:

- Barrington Road Pond – Hoffman Estates
- Buffalo Woods Pond – Lyons
- Busse Lake North Pool – Elk Grove Village
- Crawdad Slough – Willow Springs
- Deer Grove Lake – Palatine
- Hidden Pond – Hickory Hills

Visitors skate at their own risk—ice conditions are not monitored by the Forest Preserves. A minimum of 4” of solid ice over the entire lake is strongly recommended.
