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2022 Forest Preserve Permit Users Survey Summary Report

Purpose

To analyze data from event permits held during 2022 in the 13th District of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County (FPDCC) and survey the permit holders to measure user satisfaction and identify improvements.

Notes

- 1. Each percentage is rounded to the nearest .1%.
- 2. "±" followed by a number represents "standard deviation." Standard deviation is a measure of the amount of variation or dispersion of a set of values.
- 3. Below is the scale that permit holders used when answering questions:
 - 1 Star Poor
 - 2 Stars Below Average
 - 3 Stars Average
 - 4 Stars Above Average
 - 5 Stars Excellent

Summary Findings

Several highlights arose from the survey of permit holders.

- 1. As of September 26, 2022, the FPDCC sold 604 event permits for the 2022 Season.
- 2. Collectively, permit holders estimated more than 58,381 visitors attended their events.
- 3. The most common FPDCC site (per the survey results) was Bunker Hill, which had 38 events, accounting for 49.4% of events.
- 4. 34.6% of all users where first time users, many of which credited the pandemic for their use of Cook Country Forest Preserves. 77.6 % of those first time users chose to have their event at the Cook County Forest Preserves because of the pandemic. This number is an increase from our 2021 survey results.
- 5. The most popular month for an event was July.
- 6. Permits were issued every day of the week, Monday through Sunday. Pre-Pandemic use was predominantly limited to Saturdays and Sundays.
- 7. Average event estimate attendance was approximately 120.
- 8. The most common event reason for the event was "family event" (66.7%).
- 9. According to the survey, a lack of adequate signage (using larger signs to identify the shelters and issues with the grass (not mowed/mowed grass not being removed) were the most common issues.

Analysis of 13th District Event Data

Overall, FPDCC issued 604 permits for events in the 13th District during the period surveyed (January 1, 2022 through November 1, 2022). Below is an analysis of data provided by District 13 Forest Preserve Survey results. 81 permit holders returned their survey which accounts for 13.4% of the permit holders. The survey was sent to 463 individual permit holders. Data below reflects responses to each question unless otherwise noted. Raw data provided by CCDFP was used at times to provide more detailed information. Please note that the number of responses are not uniform per question, as respondents did not always answer all of the questions in the survey.

Permits Issued by Preserve (77/81 Responses)

Bunker Hill was the most common preserve for an event (Based on Survey Respondent Results).

Analysis of 13th District Event Survey Data

FPDCC provided data to Commissioner Suffredin's office on each event permit in the Forest Preserves during 2022 in the 13th District. The Forest Preserves in the 13th District consist of Bunker Hill, Erickson Woods, Linne Woods, Miami Woods, St. Paul Woods, Turnbull Woods, and Wayside Woods.

Using a survey via email, Commissioner Suffredin's office used contact information from the data provided by the Forest Preserve to survey permit holders on their experience at the Forest Preserve during the 2022 Season.

Contacting Permit Holders

81 permit holders returned our survey. The response rate increased just slightly compared to 2021 our survey.

Respondents generally felt that there were enough picnic tables. The average rating of the picnic tables was 4.1 out of 5.

Trash Cans

About one-quarter of permit holders did not think there were enough trash bins at their site.

Signage

Many people stated that the Grove signage should be bigger and more visable.

People consistently requested larger signs pointing them towards the grove and for the groves to be better marked with larger grove signs.

Comments received from second time event users were generally positive but comments were also made about bathroom soap dispensers being broken, and lack of being able to speak with someone at the Forest Preserves leading up to the event.

Additional Analysis of Comments from Users of District 13 Cook County Forest <u>Preserves</u>

Conditions of Site

Overall Condition:

Permit holders were surveyed using a scale of 1 to 5. 1 was the lowest ranking and 5 was the highest. When surveyed about the condition, i.e was the grass mowed, was there trash or litter, was there graffiti, what was the condition of the grill, etc., 61% of survey respondants rated their site a 5. About 26% gave the rating of 4, 7% gave a rating of 3, 5% gave a rating of 2 and 1% gave a 1.

Signage:

93% of those surveyed felt the signage was adequate to direct them to parking, picnic groves, to the trails, and to inform them of Forest Preserve District rules and regulations. 7% did not agree that the signage was suitable. Those who did not think the signage was suitable wanted larger Grove signage and signage more visable from the parking lot.

Trash:

75% of those surveyed noted that there were enough trash recepticals. 25% said there were not. Respondents commented about having garbage and recycling bins in the grove, rather than in the parking lot, to make it easier for cleanup.

Washrooms:

81% of all those surveyed responded that they felt there were enough washrooms or comfort stations for their event. Out of a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 beinging the most cleanly and 1 being the least, 35% of those who submitted a survey scored their comfort station or washroom a 5, the highest level cleanliness. 29% selected 4, the second highest level, 19% scored the washrooms a 3, 9% scored a 2 and 8% scored the washrooms a 1. Respondents commented about the lack of cleanliness in the portable and free standing washrooms.

Parking

Respondents stated that it would be better if the parking was reserved for guests of the event as guests had to park outside of the event location because parking spaces had been filled.

93% of those surveyed determined that there was adequate parking to accomdoate their party. 7% did not feel like there was enough parking.

Water Pumps

38% of those responded that they had access to a water pump, 62% did not have access to a water pump. 88% of those who did not have a working water pump noted that the lack of a pump was not a major issue. 12% said that it was an issue.

Picnic Table Conditions:

On a scale of 1 to 5 ranking the condition of the picnic table, 35% of survey respondants rated the condition of the picnic tables a 5. 43% ranked the condition a 4, 18% rated the condition a 3, 4% gave a rating of 2, and 0 gave a rating of 1. 90% of those surveyed indicated that there were enough tables on site for their event. 10% said that there were not enough tables on site. Respondents commented that some picnic tables are in need of being replaced.

Internet/WiFi Access:

This year, we asked respondents if access to the internet/WiFi would benefit their experience at the Grove. 61% of those surveyed responded that this access wold benefit their experience and 39% responded that it would not. Others commented that access to an electric outlet would be helpful.

Other Comments:

Respondents noted that graffiti needed to be painted over. Respondents also complained about members of the public using reserved spaces and picnic tables.

Recommendations

We propose the following recommendations:

- 1. Maintain and clean all public restrooms and portable washrooms on a regular basis but especially before a reserved event. Make sure washrooms are stocked with soap, hand sanitizer, toilet paper, and drying mechanism. Consider placing hand sanitizing stations in high volume areas and/or at the Grove Shelter.
- 2. Improve Grove signage around the Forest Preserves. Clearly state the Grove number in addition to signs directing residents towards the groves from the street. Consider sending map of Preserve and Grove ahead of event so users can review and contact the Forest Preserves with any questions ahead of scheduled event.
- 3. Consider a signage board or some mechanism to notify the public that a Grove is rented for a private event and the date/time of said reservation so members of the general public do not take the space and tables needed for a reserved event.
- 4. Regular mowing of grass and maintanence of the site is a key request of Forest Preserve users. Consider doing a check the day before any reserved event to ensure the site is mowed and grass clippings have been cleaned ahead of time.
- 5. Consider reserving some amount of parking for event users. Although not all grove parking sites are alike, perhaps a percentage of parking spaces can be allocated for event users or one spot for loading/unloading items being used for the event.
- 6. A long term consideration could be to upgrade the Grove sites to offer Internet/WiFi and outlets. These can be charged to the user as an add on item or can be offered universally in the Forest Preserves.
