PROPOSED RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING LAURA RERICHA-ANCHOR ON THE PUBLICATION OF FLORA OF THE CHICAGO REGION: A FLORISTIC AND ECOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS

WHEREAS, the Preserves' nearly 70,000 acres of natural lands are home to some of the nation's most biologically diverse flora and fauna, inspiring a wide array of scientists and students to better understand the natural world; and

WHEREAS, Laura Rericha-Anchor is a wildlife biologist with the Forest Preserves of Cook County's Resource Management Department, where she has worked since 1997 to protect and preserve the plants and animals of the forest preserves; and

WHEREAS, in the course of her duties Laura explores, researches, and documents the plants and animals of the Forest Preserves of Cook County, significantly contributing to the Preserves' restoration efforts, and the health of the region's plant and animal communities; and

WHEREAS, Laura's observations of the natural world have advanced - and continue to advance - our understanding of how to better preserve and protect the Preserves; and

WHEREAS, Laura has worked in partnership with co-author Dr. Gerould Wilhelm, Director of Research at The Conservation Institute to produce the *Flora of the Chicago Region: A Floristic and Ecological Synthesis*, a groundbreaking book that celebrates our region's biodiversity. The publication details 3,149 plant species and documents the delicate, yet powerful world of plants, their pollinators, and their environment; and

WHEREAS, this publication was inspired by a book originally published in 1969 by Floyd Swink, a renowned taxonomist and beloved naturalist who delighted in sharing his knowledge of the Midwest's remarkable flora and fauna, and mentored both Laura and Dr. Wilhelm; and

WHEREAS, during the course of their fieldwork Laura and Dr. Wilhelm discovered a new plant species which they named *Hypericum swinkianum* (or Swink's St. John's Wort) in honor of Floyd Swink; and

WHEREAS, *Flora of the Chicago Region* is significant for its breadth and depth, including 619 more species than its predecessor, clearly defining plant communities, updating nomenclature, and identifying what makes our plant communities so unique. This book will be used by national and regional agencies and institutions to determine the quality of natural areas and serves as a model for other regions; and

WHEREAS, Flora of the Chicago Region significantly adds to the current body of scientific knowledge, enabling both the professional and amateur botanist to better understand our region's plants and insects; and

WHEREAS, Laura has spent more than 50,000 hours over the last 15 years to co-author this book, and the Preserves is proud to have supported her in this scientific endeavor; and

WHEREAS, Laura and Dr. Wilhelm have created a book whose beautiful illustrations and informative 1,371 pages provide an encyclopedic listing of our region's remarkable flora; and

WHEREAS, this book will inspire people to take a closer look at the intricate natural world around them, more deeply appreciate this region's natural heritage, and to consider what each of us can do to heal the environment; and

WHEREAS, Laura has contributed significantly to the field of botany and to advancing the mission of Page 6 of 36

the Preserves, and is a deeply valued employee of the Forest Preserves and the region's conservation community.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING FRIENDS OF BLUFF SPRING FEN FOR 35 YEARS OF SERVICE TO PROTECT BLUFF SPRING FEN

WHEREAS, the Forest Preserves of Cook County (the "Preserves") manages nearly 70,000 acres of public land, including 23 dedicated nature preserve sites that represent some of the highest quality natural lands in the state. The designation of these sites is overseen by the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission and protects some of the last and best remaining examples of Illinois' wilderness; and

WHEREAS, in 1982 Bluff Spring Fen, a 95-acre site in Elgin, Illinois, was a desolate dumping ground and former gravel quarry until "Friends of the Fen", a visionary and grassroots group founded by Doug Taron, Leon Halloran and Steven Byers, recognized the significance of the site with its rare fen and remarkable landscape, and launched a concerted stewardship effort; and

WHEREAS, Friends of the Fen later became Friends of Bluff Spring Fen, and have worked tirelessly to protect and restore the area, resulting in the site being designated a Nature Preserve in 1987; and

WHEREAS, Friends of Bluff Spring Fen encouraged the Forest Preserves of Cook County to acquire this area in 2006, thus ensuring the site's continued protection; and

WHEREAS, Bluff Spring Fen Nature Preserve is now one of the Preserves' premier locations with more than 400 plant, 60 butterfly, and 30 dragonfly varieties and nearly 100 migratory and nesting bird species, and affords the residents of Cook County the opportunity to explore nature and experience a peaceful and idyllic place; and

WHEREAS, the Preserves deeply values its partnership with the Friends of Bluff Spring Fen who continue to care for the site and collaborate with surrounding neighbors including the Forest Preserve District of Kane County, City of Elgin, Bluff City Cemetery and the Illinois Nature Preserve Commission, and have expanded stewardship efforts from the 95-acre Nature Preserve to an additional 65 acres of buffer to better protect this fragile site; and

WHEREAS, the Friends of Bluff Spring Fen actively participate in citizen science and have monitored Bluff Spring Fen--particularly its rare orchid and butterfly populations--since 1988. They have actively shared their data with the Preserves, and are one of the first stewardship groups in Illinois to monitor butterflies, led by Doug Taron founder of the Illinois Butterfly Monitoring Network and Chief Curator at the Chicago Academy of Sciences/Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum. They have also been successful in reintroducing the rare Swamp Metalmark butterfly at the site; and

WHEREAS, the Preserves greatly appreciates the spirit of collaboration, generosity, and enthusiasm that the Friends of Bluff Spring Fen bring to everything they do and recognizes that this volunteer group has inspired countless others to become interested and actively engaged in caring for the Forest Preserves.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County and General Superintendent Arnold Randall do hereby congratulate the Friends of Bluff Spring Fen on their 35th anniversary and on their success in restoring and protecting Bluff Spring Fen, a remarkable and unique remnant of our region's natural heritage; and

Reason: Requesting authorization for the Forest Preserve District of Cook County to enter into and execute a "Private At-Grade Crossing Agreement" (the "Agreement") with the Union Pacific Railroad ("UP"), for construction of a new multi-use path/at-grade crossing (the "Path") at Mile Post 6.5 along the abandoned Weber Industrial Lead. As part of the Agreement, UP is granting the Preserves a license to construct the Path over a portion of UP's property. The Preserves will be responsible for future maintenance costs associated with the project. The proposed agreement also requires the Preserves to indemnify the railroad for certain liabilities. The proposed agreement is subject to final review and approval by the Preserves' Legal Department.

The Agreement will allow the Preserves to provide a direct connection for the extension of the North Branch Bicycle Trail project "Stage 2" between Forest Glen Avenue and Irene C. Hernandez Family Picnic Area. In September 2016, the Preserves completed construction of "Stage 1", one and a half (1.5) miles of paved trail from Devon and Caldwell to Forest Glen Avenue. The project provides a connection to the City of Chicago's Bike System at Gompers Park to the Forest Preserves North Branch Bicycle Trail. The North Branch Trail is the Preserves' longest linear trail system, one of the Preserves' most used bicycle trails and is a regional trail system recognized on a nationally recognized trail system.

Summary: This project continues the successful "Bird the Preserves" initiative that was launched in 2015, through a grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service via Chicago Wilderness. This grant-funded initiative connects diverse communities to the Preserves by expanding birding programs and activities, and strives to establish the Preserves as a premier birding destination in the Chicago Wilderness region. Because of the project's enormous success, the Preserves has sought and secured funding from the Forest Preserve Foundation for Phase II of Bird the Preserves. Phase II will build on the initiative's programmatic and partner building success and momentum, while developing a process for sustaining the initiative into future years at the Preserves.

Judy Pollock will provide support for Phase II of the Bird the Preserves initiative. Specific deliverables include:

• Continue the programmatic and marketing initiatives developed in Bird the Preserves Phase I,

including partner-led bird walks and the Big Sit, pursue the engagement of new birders, and continue to serve as a resource to bird groups, providing information to the Preserves for birding events for the Preserves seasonal brochures.

- Will provide a report that will include a series of recommendations for how this work and these partnerships can continue in the future.
- Connect Bird the Preserves participants to volunteer opportunities at restoration sites and develop, a plan for ongoing promotion of restoration workdays to birders and birding groups.
- Incorporate and promote best practices for bird habitat into Conservation@Home, the Preserves' newly developed initiative that encourages homeowners to transform their yards with native plants and practices that conserve water and provide habitat for native birds, butterflies and other wildlife.
- Support a celebration of International Migratory Bird Day at LaBagh Woods on May 20, 2017 and other bird related events.

A completed report at the end of the contract will include recommendations for sustaining Bird the Preserves as an ongoing programmatic component of the Preserves and will take into consideration partners' needs and the Preserves resource capacity. At the end of the project, the Preserves will have a better understanding of the birding community's interest in continued partnerships with the Preserves and recommendations on how to maintain those relationships.

Judy Pollock Consulting is a sole source provider of this service because of her unique access to the birding community, knowledge of birding in Cook County, knowledge of bird conservation and her extensive work in all of these areas. Judy Pollock has spent many years working on birding, bird science and bird conservation in the Chicago area. Judy Pollock was one of the Founders of the Bird Conservation Network Survey, she was director of Audubon Chicago Region (the regional office for the Chicago Area) for fifteen (15) years and her work has focused on building capacity by birding groups, local communities and government agencies to enhance bird conservation efforts. Judy Pollock serves as a board member or as an advisor on bird conservation and natural area issues to the City of Chicago, Chicago Park District, and Chicago Audubon. She founded Wild Indigo Nature Explorations, a Southside community engagement project that won the National Association of County Park and Recreation Officials Award in 2014. Judy Pollock recently won an award for her work in conservation and community from the American Birding Association. Judy Pollock has published several bird conservation plans and articles since 2000. The Preserves entered into a contract with Judy Pollock for Phase I, and it is important for the continuation and success of the initiative that she be brought back to complete Phase II.

Request: Requesting authority to enter into an IGA with the Village of Skokie, Illinois for construction of (1) an approximately ten (10) foot wide, two thousand three hundred (2,300) foot asphalt trail and two hundred and fifty (250) foot stone spur between Harms Road and Woods Drive ("Stage I"), and (2) an approximately ten (10) foot wide, two hundred and fifty (250) foot asphalt trail connecting the Forest Preserve trails on the west side of Harms Road ("Stage II"). Stage I and Stage II are collectively the "Trail Connection".

Goods or Services: The Forest Preserve District of Cook County (the "Preserves") operates and maintains the North Branch Bicycle Trail in Northern Cook County. The Trail Connection is part of Skokie's Bikeway System Plan to provide bicycle/pedestrian accommodations for residents, businesses, shopping malls, schools and transit connections along Old Orchard Road from Gross Point Road to the North Branch Trail. This agreement covers the approximately two thousand eight hundred (2,800) linear feet of trails that will be built on Forest Preserve property on the south side of Old Orchard Road.

Agreement Period: Perpetual (subject to termination after ten (10) years).

Summary: Skokie has requested an Intergovernmental Agreement to construct the proposed Trail Connection. Skokie has obtained Transportation Alternatives Program funding for the construction of Stage 1 of Trail Connection. Skokie will be responsible for all design, permitting and construction costs associated with the Trail Connection, subject to review of final plans and specifications by the Preserves.

All requirements regarding insurance and bonds must be met. It is anticipated that approximately one hundred and ten (110) trees will be removed for this project. For each tree that is removed, Skokie will plant replacement trees or pay the replacement cost of planting the trees. The Preserves anticipates that the Trail Connection will be completed within approximately five (5) years. Skokie will be responsible for long-term maintenance of the Trail Connection upon completion, including annual inspections and snow removal. The Preserves, however, will retain responsibility for trimming and removing trees.

Under the IGA, Skokie and the Forest Preserve agree that the asphalt, gravel, and other material that are used to create the Trail Connection ("Trail Connection Material") will be the property of Skokie, for the duration of this Agreement to the extent of the following: (1) the Trail Connection Material is not deemed under Illinois law to be a permanent fixture and/or real property, (2) Skokie ownership of the Trail Connection Material is not deemed to be a transfer or conveyance of property from the Preserves

that is unlawful and unauthorized under the Preserves' Enabling Act (70 ILCS §810/0.01 *et seq*), and (3) Skokie's ownership of the Trail Connection Material is not in violation of the Preserves' Code of Ordinances, including, without limitation, Sections 2-3-1 (Erection and Ownership of Structures), 2-5-4 (Transfer of Land), and 2-5-8 (Required Review Factors). The Intergovernmental Agreement is subject to final review and approval by the Preserves' Legal Department.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN AMENDMENT TO THE FOREST PRESERVE DISTRICT PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RULES OF ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter Title 1 - Administrative, Chapter 5 - Forest Preserve District President and Board of Commissioners Rules of Organization and Procedure, Section 1-5-4 - Parliamentary Rules, Subsection 4-30 - Public Testimony, of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

1-5-4: - PARLIAMENTARY RULES.

4-30. Public testimony. Subject to the provisions herein, public testimony will be permitted at regular and special meetings of the Board. Authorization as a public speaker shall only be granted to those individuals who have submitted in writing, their name, address, subject matter, and organization (if any) to the Secretary 24 hours in advance of the meeting on an electronically submitted "Record of Committee Witness" form. Duly authorized public speakers shall be called upon to deliver testimony at a time specified in the meeting agenda. Public testimony must be germane to a specific item(s) on the meeting agenda, and the testimony-must not exceed three minutes; and the Secretary will keep track of the time and advise when the time for public testimony has expired. Public Speakers shall indicate the item that they are a proponent or opponent of and shall only speak to that item. Persons authorized to provide public testimony shall not use vulgar, abusive or otherwise inappropriate language when addressing the Board. Failure to act appropriately; failure to speak to an item that is germane to the meeting, or failure to adhere to the time requirements may result in expulsion from the meeting and/or disqualify the person from providing future testimony.

Individuals may submit a "Record of Committee Witness" form to the Secretary in support or opposition to an item on any agenda without testifying in person. The "Record of Committee Witness" form shall also allow for, but not mandate, the submission of a written statement in support of or in opposition to an item on an agenda. The Secretary shall announce to each Committee whether any "Record of Committee Witness" forms have been submitted, whether the forms support or oppose an item and any statements filed on those forms.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.
